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ALTERNATIVE MEATS AND ALTERNATIVE STATISTICS: WHAT DOES THE DATA SAY?

The alternative animal product arena, also known as "fake meats," has received a lot of media attention and venture capital hype this year. Most of the analysis and discussion has focused on bovine alternatives (e.g. "Impossible" and "Beyond" hamburgers) because of the iconic position of cattle in many climate and sustainability discussions. This presentation will provide an overview on the technologies that are used to produce the various alternative meat products, who has invested, who is selling it, who is buying it, how it is currently regulated and analyze some of the claims being made in the context of documented sustainability metrics.
